IMPORT HEALTH REQUIREMENTS OF UKRAINE  
FOR DAY-OLD CHICKS, POULTS, DUCKLINGS,  
GOSLINGS AND HATCHING EGGS FROM THE UNITED STATES

Poultry and hatching eggs must be accompanied by a U.S. Origin Health Certificate (VS Form 17-6) issued by a veterinarian authorized by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and endorsed by a Veterinary Services (VS) veterinarian. The certificate shall contain the name and address of both the consignor and the consignee. Additional information shall include:

CERTIFICATION STATEMENTS

1. The United States has been free of African Swine fever and foot-and-mouth disease for at least 3 years.
2. The flock of origin is free from Pullorum disease and fowl typhoid under the USDA National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP). (Providing the NPIP approval number in column 9 on VS Form 17-6 will meet this requirement.)
3. The flock of origin has been clinically free of ornithosis, lethal-type avian influenza, infectious laryngotracheitis, New Castle disease, infectious encephalomyelitis, duckling fever, infectious turkey rhinotracheitis, Marek's disease, infectious bronchitis, and Gumboro disease for the last 12 months.
4. The day old poultry (except broilers) were vaccinated for Marek's disease with a vaccine, approved by USDA.
5. The hatching eggs were disinfected by recognized approved methods not later than two hours after laying and before shipment.
6. The parent flock was vaccinated for infectious bronchitis and New Castle disease with killed products prior to onset of production.

OTHER INFORMATION

1. Hatching eggs and day old poultry must be shipped in disinfected and disposable containers.
